## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

A Social Impact Assessment study was conducted by the Meghalaya Institute of Governance with regards to acquisition of land at 18<sup>th</sup> Mile Umdoh village measuring 60697.97 sq. m or 14.999 acres. The purpose for the land acquisition is to establish an Integrated Facilitation Centre – Entry Point to facilitate the entry of vehicles and people into Meghalaya.

The village of Umdoh is a medium sized village with a total of 147 households. It has a mixed community composed of people from the Khasi, Garo, War-Jaintia communities as well as people from other communities. It falls in the Umling C&RD Block, Ri Bhoi District. It is approximately 15 kms from the District Headquarter, Nongpoh and approximately 29 kms from the Assam – Meghalaya state border. The land to be acquired may be classified as hilly arable land. This proposed project site is on the NH -40.

The land proposed to be acquired belongs to Shri Jried Khongjoh. On it are 5 residential structures which are occupied by himself and his family members which will be demolished once the land is acquired. There are seven families whose income are dependent on the area to be acquired. The land is cultivated on by his children and two other households who rent a part of the land to cultivate on. A variety of fruits, vegetables and other horticultural products including beetle nut, beetle leaf, pine apple, jack fruit, pepper, banana and other fruits are grown. Apart from this there is one chicken coop and one car wash at the foothill which will be demolished once the land is acquired.

Adjacent to the land is an Anganwadi centre as well as a village footpath constructed under the MGNREGA scheme. There is also a non-

functioning water pump on the project site and 2 water sources near the project site.

During the Key Informant Interviews conducted with the land owner and his children (PAP) it was recorded that they were willing to part with the land on the condition that they would not have to enrol themselves for an Aadhar number. However, during the Public Hearing, the children of Shri Jried Khongjoh made known that they did not want the government to acquire their land as they have no other land.

On the 20th of March 2018, a Public Hearing was held at 18th Mile Umdoh village which was chaired by Shri Aiban Swer OSD MIG. The Public Hearing was attended by more than 120 persons. During the Public Hearing a representative from the Office of the Sordar, Nongpoh Elaka who pointed out that already a Public Hearing had already been held for another site for the same purpose. He wanted to know why the location of the site for the Entry Point been shifted from the initial proposed site at 19<sup>th</sup> Mile to 18<sup>th</sup> Mile when the project site at 19th Mile had been accepted by the public. He also said that the NOC had not been given by the Office of the Sordar. Further, he requested that prior information be given to the Elaka before holding any other Public Hearing. While another participant in the Public Hearing also made known that the area to be acquired contains the water sources which needs to be protected as they provide water to the neighbouring villages also. Also, the Secretary of Umdoh village submitted to the OSD, MIG a letter with conditions for setting up the Integrated Facilitation Centre - Entry Point at 18th Mile such as the monitoring of construction workers in the proposed project. Community members who spoke during the day accepted the proposed project. The land owner too accepted the project. The occupants of the proposed project site were opposed to the land acquisition as they have no other land.

The Social Impact Management Plan prepared for this project provides for the replacement of lost residential structure through the Indira Awaz Yojana Scheme to the 5 HHs who will lose their houses. It also provides for compensatory afforestation and the protection of water sources.

## **CHAPTER 1: INTRODUCTION**

#### ABOUT SOCIAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT

The Social Impact Assessment process began as part of the new land acquisition act called the Right to Fair Compensation, Transparency in Land Acquisition Resettlement and Rehabilitation Act, 2013 of the Government of India. It is a people friendly, rights-based approach to development that took into consideration impacts from the loss of land, probable impacts to the wellbeing, security, sentiments of the people, impacts to the institutions present near the project site that the implementation of the government project might bring about; not just from an environmental point of view but from the social –institutional point of view.

Prior to this, land acquisition was at the behest of the requiring department. It was based on the idea of "eminent domain" wherein land was thought to be placed at the disposal of the state and land could be used in any way it saw fit without any consideration whether the acquisition of the land would be detrimental to the people who resided on or who used the land. It ignored that land acquisition for any project may also cause certain difficulties to peoples' livelihoods, activities, social and political structure and the environment. Thus on 31<sup>st</sup> December 2014 the President of India promulgated an ordinance with the official mandate to "meet the twin objectives of farmer welfare along with expeditiously meeting the strategic and development needs of the country."

As per the Act the state or union government can acquire land, provided it shows the "public purpose" of the project. Public purpose includes projects related for strategic purposes such as those related to the armed forces, national security; infrastructure projects; projects for project affected families; projects which provide housing for low income groups; projects for residential purposed of the poor or landless and those displaced by natural calamities or other reasons. The underlying clause in this Act was that land acquisition could only occur if 70% of the population to be affected agrees to the land acquisition.

The new land acquisition act warrants the carrying out of a Social Impact Assessment study to ascertain whether the land acquisition would be beneficial or detrimental to the community which is a stakeholder. The Meghalaya Institute of Governance, one of the instrumental support institutions of the Meghalaya Basin Development Authority was notified as the State Nodal Social Impact Assessment Unit as per the Right to Fair Compensation, Transparency in Land Acquisition Resettlement Rehabilitation Act 2013 to conduct Social Impact Assessments.

Rigorous field level data collection exercises were conducted for this purpose. They begin with a preliminary site visit to assess the project site and help in preparing a detailed TOR for the project. The next step, with the help of the acquiring body is to meet with direct stakeholders such as village durbar members as well as the land owners, residents of the village who would be indirectly affected by the land acquisition, but directly affected by the proposed project. The final step is to hold a public meeting bringing together, the district authority, the village authority, the land owners and the village residents to air out any further grievances or thoughts on the proposed land acquisition.

The Meghalaya Institute of Governance was notified to conduct a Social Impact Assessment Study on land acquisition at 18<sup>th</sup> Mile, Ri Bhoi District for the purpose of establishing a *Facilitation Centre at the Entry* Point via Notification No.RDA.28/2017/11 dated 11<sup>th</sup> July 2017<sup>1</sup>. The objective of the

study is to prepare a complete inventory of structures, affected families and persons and to identify social impacts.

#### INTRODUCTION TO THE PROBLEM

The concept of an Integrated Facilitation Centre – Entry and Exit Point came up as a concession to the demands of local pressure groups to set up the Inner Line Permit and thus check on the entry of unwanted elements into the state. The Integrated Facilitation Centre – Entry and Exit Point was proposed to be set up in all sensitive areas of the state to address the issues of influx in the state and illegal immigration into the state.

The objective of this study is to assess the likely impacts on the village and its residents from the setting up such a project in the site. The research team looked at both the positive as well as the negative impacts the Entry Point would bring.

#### **OBJECTIVE OF PROJECT**

The main objective for the proposed Integrated Facilitation Centre at the Entry point is to prevent and check the influx of the illegal entry into the State. The Entry Point will act as a facilitation centre for visitors to the state.<sup>2</sup>

#### PROJECT LOCATION

The site to be acquired for the project is in Umdoh village, 18<sup>th</sup> Mile, Byrnihat, Ri Bhoi District. It falls within the Umling C&RD Block. It is about 15 km to the district headquarter at Nongpoh and 29 km from the Assam-Meghalaya border.

#### **DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT SITE**

The project area measures 60697.97 sq. m or 14.999 acres more or less. It may be classified as cultivated hilly terrain. The proposed project site is

cultivation land and on it is grown a variety of plantation crops. The proposed project site is connected to NH-40 on the North Western slope.

#### **OWNERSHIP OF LAND**

The area is the property of one sole individual land owner, Shri Jried Khongjoh. On it is present a number of residential structures as well as commercial structures which are owned or occupied by relatives of Shri Jried Khongjoh.

#### NEED FOR THE PROJECT

The need for the project arose out of the need to better facilitate travellers to the state and ease their entry and exit. It will also serve as a check point for illegal migrants and undocumented persons. The Facilitation centre will also act as an information centre for tourism and registration of migrant labourers.

## **CHAPTER 2: RESEARCH METHODOLOGY**

The research strategy that the SIA-Unit used is a descriptive method. This method describes the specific behaviour or facts concerning the nature of the situation. It involves the gathering of data that describe the events; organisation, tabulation, depiction and description of the data collected.

#### PRIMARY DATA

The research team held interviews with the Headman of Umdoh village, Shri Donhok Kshiar, the Secretary of the village of Umdoh, Shri Steward Sangma on 4<sup>th</sup> August, 2017, with the land owner Shri Jreit Khongjoh, his children and their spouses who are occupants and users of the land including Shri Shaniah Paswet who is mentioned as the owner of one structure on the land proposed to be acquired on 25<sup>th</sup> August 2017. During these interactions Key Informant Interviews (KII) were conducted with them using a checklist and an open ended questionnaire. The methods used were both structured and unstructured and designed based on the likely impact on the project area.

#### Reconnaissance Field Survey

A preliminary site visit was first carried out on 4<sup>th</sup> August 2017. It involves identifying the likely significant impacts of the project which needs to be investigated and also defining the approach that will be taken for their assessments to complete the initial scope of work. The Reconnaissance survey helped develop the Terms of Reference (TOR) for this SIA study.

#### Stakeholder Consultation

Good practice requires active consultation with relevant affected communities and other interested and affected parties. As such KIIs were held with the Village Headman and the Village Secretary and on another day, the SIA – Unit met with the land owner and the occupants and users of the land that is proposed to be acquired. The aim of these interactions is to give the respondents an opportunity to express their views on the project and its impacts so that these can be taken into account while developing mitigation impacts.

#### **SECONDARY DATA**

The research team first reviewed and researched related literature to understand the requirement and needs of the project area. Based on the review of secondary data the team was able to get an insight on the background of the project and this has allowed for group identification and formulation of questionnaire design. Secondary data such as project details, type of investment, maps and details of land owners were obtained from the Office of the Deputy Commissioner, Ri Bhoi District, Nongpoh.

#### **PUBLIC HEARING**

A Public Hearing on the proposed land acquisition for setting up an Entry Point at Umdoh village, 18<sup>th</sup> Mile Ri Bhoi District on the 20<sup>th</sup> March 2018 in the village itself. Due to the notification of the Meghalaya State Assembly elections the Public Hearing was delayed till the elections concluded and the model code of conduct ended<sup>3</sup>. The Public Hearing was chaired by the OSD of MIG, Shri Aiban Swer. In attendance was Smt. V. Hynniewta, MCS, BDO

Umling C&RD Block, Shri Donbok Kshiar, Village Headman of Umdoh village, the land owner Shri Jreid Khongjoh and members of the Village Executive Council and the residents of Umdoh village.

The village of Umdoh is under the Umling C&RD Block, Ri Bhoi District, Meghalaya. The village of Umdoh is composed of a mixed tribal community of Khasi, Bhoi, Garo, War-Jaintia and other communities.

Figure 1 Residential Structure in the Project Site









- b. Loss of community hand pump.

#### INTERACTION WITH LAND OWNER SHRI. JREID KHONGJOH

A KII was held with the land owner Shri. Jried Khongjoh on 25<sup>th</sup> August 2017 at his residence in Umdoh. Shri Jried Khongjoh is a male of the ST (Khasi) community and aged about 77 years old. He had bought the land in

1982<sup>4</sup>. Shri Khongjoh has 8 adult children who are all occupants and users of the proposed project site. Shri Khongjoh used to be an agriculturalist.





This land had been divided between his children to cultivate and reside on. There are also 7 residential structures on the area proposed to be acquired. Apart from them, he had rented out part of the land to 2 individuals to cultivate upon.

To Shri Jreid Khongjoh, the loss of this land would mean a loss of-:

- a. Agricultural land
- b. Loss of agricultural produce
- c. Loss of rent.
- d. Loss of residence.


The data shown above was collected during Key Informant Interviews held with the occupants of the land who could be present. The information was collected using structured questionnaires.

From the interaction above it was learnt that Shri Jreid Khongjoh, the land owner had given his children and their spouses' rights to cultivate over the land. Apart from this there are two individuals who rent his land to cultivate on.

The interaction with most of the respondents showed that most of the respondents would have to be relocated as their residences (either partially or totally) would have to be demolished. These respondents are mainly agriculturalists and their incomes are dependent on the land.

Another occupant of the land Shanrishisha who owns a car wash at the foot hills could not be contacted.

#### **CHAPTER 5: PUBLIC HEARING**





A Public Hearing on the proposed land acquisition for setting up an Entry Point at Umdoh village, 18<sup>th</sup> Mile Ri Bhoi District on the 20<sup>th</sup> March 2018 in the village itself. As the Meghalaya State Assembly elections were declared by the Election Commission of India the holding of the Public Hearing was put on hold till after<sup>6</sup>. The Public Hearing was chaired by the OSD of MIG, Shri Aiban Swer. In attendance was Smt. V. Hynniewta, MCS, BDO Umling C&RD Block, Shri Donbok Kshiar, Village Headman of Umdoh village, the land owner Shri

Shri Stanley Roy Syngkli, Myntri Rangbah, Sordar Secretary and under Nongpoh Sordarship said that no information prior given to the Sordar on the change in proposed project location from 19th Mile, Ri Bhoi to 18th Mile, Ri Bhoi. He also asked that the

government should share the final decision made by the government on 19th Mile so that the people are aware why 18th Mile is chosen from the proposed land acquisition for setting up Entry Point.

**Response:** The Chairman of the meeting clarified that Meghalaya Institute of Governance has been notified as a nodal agency to conduct Social Impact Assessment Study only while Land acquisition is solely based on the Revenue Branch, Ri Bhoi.

Shri S. Mawiong resident of Figure 9 Public Hearing on 20th March 2018

18th Mile said that the government has brought a lot of development and such development in the village is welcome by the people. He is thankful to the land owner for being so generous to give his land for development. He asked





if local youth can be given employment opportunity especially for the educated one.

Response: The chariman said that not only educated young people will be employment but people with capabilities and wiliness to work will be employment during the project construction and implementation phase.

Shri T. Syngkli resident of 18th Mile said that there were too manv Public hearing held on Entry Point far no but so working process has been witness. He also said that during the project construct drinking water source near the project location will be

taken into grave consideration.

Response: The Chairman said that only after the government makes a final decision on which land will be acquired then only the work will process in the selected land.

of 18th Mile said that the Entry and Exit Point is a good initiative taken by the government for developmental purpose but what is disappointing is many time employment opportunity are taken away from the local people. Another thing is no


Figure 11 Public Hearing on 20th March 2018

Smt. Ryndong, eldest daughter of the Landowner said that giving away ones land for development is a generous act however she requested the government that Land acquisition for the proposed Entry point at 18th Mile be shifted to

19th Mile as the family needs the land for their livelihood activity.

Smt. Sarah Ryndong, wife of the landowner said that she wants to give the land for the proposed acquisition of Entry Point in 18th Mile but her children are against the acquisition.

The Public Hearing was concluded by Shri Aiban Swer after the representations from the stakeholders, including the land owner and his family.

As well as representations from the Durbar of the Elaka of Nongpoh and from the village members themselves. The Village Durbar of 18<sup>th</sup> Mile also submitted their points on the conduct of the Entry Point at 18<sup>th</sup> Mile Village.

## **CHAPTER 5: MAJOR FINDINGS**

The following chapter discusses the main findings from the field study that the SIA-Unit collected through its own observations and through interactions with different stakeholders:

#### TYPE OF LAND

The land proposed to be acquired is agricultural land. It is on a hilly slope.

#### LAND OWNERSHIP

The land proposed to be acquired belongs to one individual Shri Jreid Khongjoh who bought the land in 1982<sup>7</sup>.

#### **USE AND ACCESS TO LAND**

The land which is mainly agricultural land is used by the land owners' immediate family as well as by his extended family to cultivate on and to also reside on. Apart from this, Shri Jried Khongjoh's land is given on rent to two individuals to cultivate on.

On a portion of his land adjacent to the local primary school is a community footpath built through the MGNREGA scheme. On it also is a hand pump which is no longer used as it has dried up.

#### PROJECT AFFECTED FAMILIES

There are a number of families that are likely to be impacted. Apart from Shri Jreid Khongjoh's family there are a number of other families also likely

to be impacted from this land acquisition such as his children who reside on the land and also cultivate on it. There are about five of these families. There are also two families who are likely to be impacted from this land acquisition as they use the land to cultivate on and their income comes from it.

Another family to be affected is the one belonging to Shanrishisha who runs a car wash on the foothill of the land to be acquired.

From the Public Hearing it was learnt that while the land owner Shri Jreid Khongjoh was willing to accept the offer for land acquisition, his family who would be directly affected by the same land acquisition were opposed to it.

#### STRUCTURES TO BE AFFECTED

There are a number of structures to be affected. There are 7 residences both kutcha and pucca to be affected. There is also a chicken coop which will be impacted from the land acquisition. These structures will be completely demolished after the land acquisition.

#### ALTERNATE PLACE FOR THE PROJECT

This area is well suited to the need of the project.

#### ROADS AND TRANSPORT

The project site is located on NH-40. It is important to stress at this point the necessity and importance of this road as the lifeline of the state. This road is an arterial road for the state of Meghalaya. It forms one of Meghalaya's only connect to the other North-Eastern states through Assam and to the rest of India. This road is the main route for vehicles carrying food supplies, petroleum and all other goods to the state of Meghalaya.

The smooth flow and safety of traffic plying on this road is a strict priority during all project phases. As this road serves as the main point of entry and exit into the state, the integrity of the road condition must be a priority.

#### WATER SOURCES

There are about two water sources near the project site. On the land of Smt. Detam Pohtam on the south east boundary of this plot of land to be acquired there is one spring. Another spring can be found on the southern part of this project site on the land of Shri. Jreid Khongjoh.

Apart from this, there is a non-working hand pump on the project site itself.

#### CHILDREN AND WOMEN

The proposed land acquisition will affect female agriculturalists who cultivate on the land. Most of these would be the daughters of Shri. Jreid Khongjoh. This land acquisition is a cause of concern for one female respondent during the KII as she is a home maker and the daughter in law of Shri. Jreid Khongjoh, she is wary of the possibility of having to relocate after the land acquisition. Other respondents who are wary of having to relocate require that the place they are relocated to is close to the present project site.

As there is a school near to the project site which provides ICDS schemes to local children, there might be slight disturbance during the construction phase. As the land proposed to be acquired is on a higher elevation than the school, there may be some loose soil that can impact the school.

#### PLACES OF RELIGIOUS AND CULTURAL IMPORTANCE

There are no places of religious, cultural importance near the land proposed to be acquired.

# SAFETY, CRIME AND VIOLENCE

The village of Umdoh has no safety concerns at present.

The respondents were only hopeful that with the coming of the Facilitation Centre - Entry Point that there would be more streetlights installed which would increase the safety of village residents.

#### **FOOD SECURITY**

The proposed land acquisition would affect mostly agriculturalist and agricultural land. The main agricultural products cultivated on the project site are plantation crops like beetle nut, beetle leaf, pineapple, bay leaf and other horticultural products. The acquisition may not affect the food security of the people directly however, the loss of cultivable land and a viable income may negatively affect food security.

#### AFFECTED OR VULNERABLE GROUPS

All of the affected households from the proposed land acquisition belong to the Scheduled Tribe (Khasi) community.

#### ECONOMIC AND LIVELIHOOD ACTIVITIES.

The economic and livelihood activities of the community would be disrupted due to this land acquisition. Shri Jreid Khongjoh and his children would lose viable agricultural land which forms a significant part of their household income. Apart from this, Shanrishisha would lose income from the loss of the car wash.

## CHAPTER 6: SOCIAL IMPACT MITIGATION PLAN

The Meghalaya Institute of Governance which is the state nodal SIA unit is pleased to present herewith the Social Impact Mitigation Plan which has been prepared to mitigate negative social impacts that may arise out of the proposed land acquisition to establish an Integrated Facilitation Centre – Entry Point according to the RFCTLAAR Act, 2013. The SIMP consists of a set of mitigation, monitoring and institutional measures to be taken during the design, construction and implementation phases of the project to reduce adverse social impacts during the various stages of the project.

#### **SUMMARY OF FINDINGS**

- The area proposed to be acquired is a hill
- The area proposed to be acquired is agricultural land
- The area proposed to be acquired belongs to only one land owner
- There are 7 families whose income is dependent on the area proposed to be acquired.
- There are 5 residential structures on the land proposed to be acquired that will have to be demolished once the land is acquired.
- There is 1 chicken coop on the land proposed to be acquired that will have to be demolished once the land is acquired.
- There is 1 car wash on the North Western foothill of the land proposed to be acquired that will be disturbed during the land acquisition process.
- There is a community footpath on the edge/boundary of the land proposed to be acquired
- There is a non-functioning water pump on the land proposed to be acquired.

- There is an Anganwadi centre bordering the land proposed to be acquired.
- There are 2 water sources near the land proposed to be acquired.
- The land owner and his extended family (who are users of the land) are willing to give the land on the condition that they do not have to enrol themselves for the Aadhar card.
- The land owner requests that employment opportunities be given to his family members once the project is in operation.
- The land owner is willing to cede with his land.
- The directly affected persons from this land acquisition were opposed to the land acquisition and requested that the site for the Entry Point be shifted elsewhere.

### MEASURES TO AVOID, MITIGATE AND COMPENSATE IMPACT

#### RESETTLEMENT MEASURES

- i. As per Section 8 of the RTFCLARR Act 2013 the Rehabilitation Commissioner shall publish the approved Rehabilitation and Resettlement Scheme by affixing it in conspicuous places in the affected areas.
- ii. As per Section 101 of the RFCTLARR Act 2013 when any land acquired under the Act remains unutilised for a period of five years, it shall be returned to the legal owners or the legal heirs.
- iii. As there will be 5 households whose residential structures will be demolished during the construction of the project, proper resettlement plans need to be put in place.
- iv. As per Section 41 (6) as the land shall be acquired from a Scheduled Tribe family, one-third of the compensation amount due should be paid to the affected family as first instalment. This would be extremely useful

- to help these families who will lose their residential structures to construct another residential structure.
- v. Replacement of lost residences by giving affected households a constructed house as per the Indira Awas Yojana<sup>8</sup> scheme or the equivalent cost of a house may be offered in lieu of the constructed house. Each affected family will not get more than one house under the provisions of this Act.

#### REHABILITATION MEASURES

- i. Even though this is a tribal dominated area there is no need to put forth a Development Plan for Scheduled Tribe families as per Section 9 of the RFCTLARR Act 2013 by the Requiring Body as it does not involve involuntary displacement of the tribal families.
- ii. Shri Jreid Khongjoh the legal land owner of the land may be compensated as per the First Schedule of the RFCTLARR Act 2013. This may include the:
  - o Market Value of land as determined under Section 26
  - o Factor by which the market value is to be multiplied in rural areas
  - o The value of assets attached to the property.
  - o Solatium, i.e. an award for inconvenience, loss or the like.
- iii. The Second Schedule of the Act is applicable to all affected families and compensation may be paid as per it. This includes
- iv. If any affected household has been reduced to the status of a marginal farmer on landless, they shall be allotted a minimum one acre of land in the command area.
- v. When jobs are created through the project, suitable training and skill development should be given so as to ensure employment at a rate not lower than the minimum wages; or;
- vi. One-time payment of five lakhs per affected families or Annuity policies that shall pay not less than two thousand rupees per month per family for twenty years.

- vii. Each affected families should be given monthly subsistence allowance for a period of one year. As they are ST displace from schedule area, another fifty thousand rupees is to be paid.
- viii. Each affected families shall be given a onetime financial assistance for transportation cost. They shall also be granted a one-time resettlement allowance.
  - ix. The family who has a chicken coop on the project site shall get a onetime financial assistance for the coop.

#### SOCIAL MEASURES

- i. The affected families should be resettled preferably in the same Scheduled Area in a compact block so that they may retain their ethnic, linguistic and cultural identity (Section 41 (7) of RFCTLARR Act, 2013).
- ii. Adherence to the conditions put forward by the Village's Executive Committee with regards to:
  - Employment to residents of the village during the construction and operation phase of the project.
  - Prior information to the Village Executive Committee before new staff are deputed to the Entry Point.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL MEASURES**

- i. Under the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980 Chapter 3 Section 3.1(i) compensatory afforestation must be made for the loss of all trees in the area.
- ii. Trees to be planted to reduce the pollution caused during construction and implementation of the project.
- iii. Protection of the water sources at the project site so as to protect it from pollution during the construction period and thereby enable its use during the operation phase of the project.

#### **MISCELLANEOUS**

i. Any disputes between the stakeholders regarding land ownership should be resolved first and made sure compensation is given to the legal owner.

- ii. Adequate measures should be placed to address unforeseen negative impacts. Institutional measures like proper Grievance Redress Mechanism (GRM) cell may be installed and a notified Grievance Redress Officer (GRO)
- iii. It is highly recommended that the desire of the community be taken into consideration and their written representation be followed.

#### Rehabilitation and Resettlement Committee

Although Section 45(1) of the RFCTLARR Act 2013 puts provision for the establishment of a Resettlement and Rehabilitation Committee only when the area of land to be acquired is more than one hundred acres, it may be suitable to constitute a similar body to see and review and monitor the progress of rehabilitation and resettlement once in a month till the process of rehabilitation and resettlement is completed. This Committee is also set up for the purposed of carrying the post-implementation social audits and grievance redress.

## **ADDENDUM**

The Meghalaya Institute of Governance received two representations from the Office of the Sirdar, Nongpoh Elaka as well as the community members of the 19<sup>th</sup> Mile Village after the Public Hearing on the 20<sup>th</sup> March, 2018.

The Office of the Sirdar, Nongpoh Elaka<sup>9</sup> stated that the Elaka had not given a NOC to the proposed acquisition of the land in 18<sup>th</sup> Mile while it had given its NOC to the land acquisition in 19<sup>th</sup> Mile Pahammawlein village. It further stated on the village of 18<sup>th</sup> Mile being a valuable catchment area to the neighbouring villages. It was also opposed to the project as the Headman of 18<sup>th</sup> Mile, Umdoh village had never received a *sanad* from the Sordar. Thus, the Office of the Sordar opposed the project as it was not in accordance to the customs and ways of functioning of the Elaka.

The second letter received<sup>10</sup> stressed the peoples' opposition to the proposed land acquisition in the 18<sup>th</sup> Mile, Umdoh village by the people of 18<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> Mile as they had already agreed upon setting up of the Integrated Facilitation Centre – Entry Point in 19<sup>th</sup> Mile. It further stated that 18<sup>th</sup> Mule is the only catchment area with many natural streams and springs which feed the River Umtru. Therefore the disturbance of such a fragile eco system may become extremely detrimental in the long run.
